PIMMIT HILLS PARK

County Park Authority Director Fred M. Packard recently announced acquisition of a new 18-acre community park here. The park, purchased at \$70,760, is located north of Magarity Road, opposite the Pimmit Hills Elementary School on the former Storm Farm.

The Pimmit Hills Citizens' Association strongly urged acquisition of the park, and was a driving force behind the purchase.

The tract, described as "open, gently rolling land," extends north to Scott's Run. The park development will be undertaken jointly by the Park Authority and the Citizens Association.

GIRL SCOUT "SKILLS DAY

A full day of contests and activities and contests has been planned with first, second, and third place ribbons and points awarded to each intermediate troop having the most skillful team of two girls entered in each of the following activities: tent pitching, first aid, fire building, knot tying, stick drawing, lashing, making bedrolls, toolcraft, and estimating heights.

At the end of the day, the troop having the highest total of points will be awarded a flag staff banner by Mrs. Phebe Parsons, Neighborhood Chairman, 121 Lisle Ave., who will also present "5-Point Pins" to Pimmit Hills Senior Troop 152. Being awarded this pin is the highlight of Girl Scouting which represents a step in each girl's life when she is ready to be of real service to her community.
